

The Free Form Committee, consisting of several teachers, met once a week for two months to carry out plans for this year's program.










Freshmen 'settle in' for stay after orientation and elections to decide first year's leaders




All girl officers, driver's ed. and powder puff football, make the sophomore year exciting






Students awarded with honors for outstanding achievements in various fields of endeavor






Curriculum changes and successful tutoring programs kept the teachers in the Math Department working this year.







In the fall, the department sponsored an all school mock election set up with all of the fall running candidates. The election gave the 18-year-olds the experience of voting.














Grafe and Davidson lead young, strong golf team; VanStone hopeful for successful season


Tennis team outlook bright; Senior Sadri Akin highlights

Grappiers finish season 3 - 6 Wallace attends Regionals




The freshman grapplers ended the year with a 4-7 record, losing squeakers to Memorial and Bosse. They also finished second in the freshman tourney with 95½ points.

Coach Giovanetti comments, "We are really looking forward to next year." With six returning




IT LOOKS AS IF senior Allan Frizzell is having a difficult time putting this opponent under his control.

lettermen who saw a lot of varsity action this year, there is a real good chance the team could "wrap" it up next year.











"SHE FLYS through the air with the greatest of ease" applies to sophomore Kim Knapp as she practices her specialty, the long jump.



Cheerleaders format changed; five boys added to squad







Baseball team continues winning season with promising pitchers, experienced infield and outfield



District Elections plan passes through Student Council's vote for next year's representatives







International Thespian Society journeys to Indiana University to preview musical, 'Mame!'







Nearing the end seniors find "So many roads to choose"






